

Support Conservation in Your Community

Your gift makes a real difference. This year, we have:

- Protected 1,300 acres in the Crooked River watershed
- Maintained 35+ miles of trails
- Engaged more than 200 volunteers
- Reached hundreds of students through outdoor learning
- Served thousands of residents and visitors each year

This spring, Western Foothills Land Trust permanently Its permanent protection ensures these areas will keep protected 1,298 acres of forest and wetlands along Mill Hill Road in Waterford.

The property is located directly across the river from the Trust's Twin Bridges Preserve, creating a connected area of over 2,375 protected acres in the Crooked River watershed. This land is crucial for the health of the Crooked River. It serves as one of the most important spawning sites for land-locked salmon in Sebago Lake and is a key water source for southern Maine.

It has two miles of cold-water stream habitat for wild brook trout, nearly 240 acres designated as a deer wintering area, and over 65 acres of wetlands that support a variety of birds, amphibians, and other wildlife. The conserved land will also improve outdoor recreation opportunities in western Maine.

Western Foothills Land Trust plans to create a trail network in the coming years to support hiking, snowshoeing, backcountry skiing, and fly fishing.


This land will remain open to hunting and trapping, which are essential for maintaining healthy ecosystems and are important to the local culture and economy.

This acquisition is part of a larger regional conservation effort led by Sebago Clean Waters, a partnership of 11 organizations aiming to speed up forest conservation to protect water quality, wildlife habitat, and community benefits throughout the Sebago Lake watershed.

Acquiring this property continues a long history of stewardship, as the land has been managed as a working forest by a local family.

providing clean water, important wildlife habitats, and public access for future generations.

Funding and support for the project came from the Land for Maine's Future Program, Maine Coast Heritage Trust, Portland Water District, Open Space Institute, Sebago Clean Waters, and several private foundations and donors. The Land Trust is currently working to name the new preserve and will start trail planning and stewardship efforts this year.
